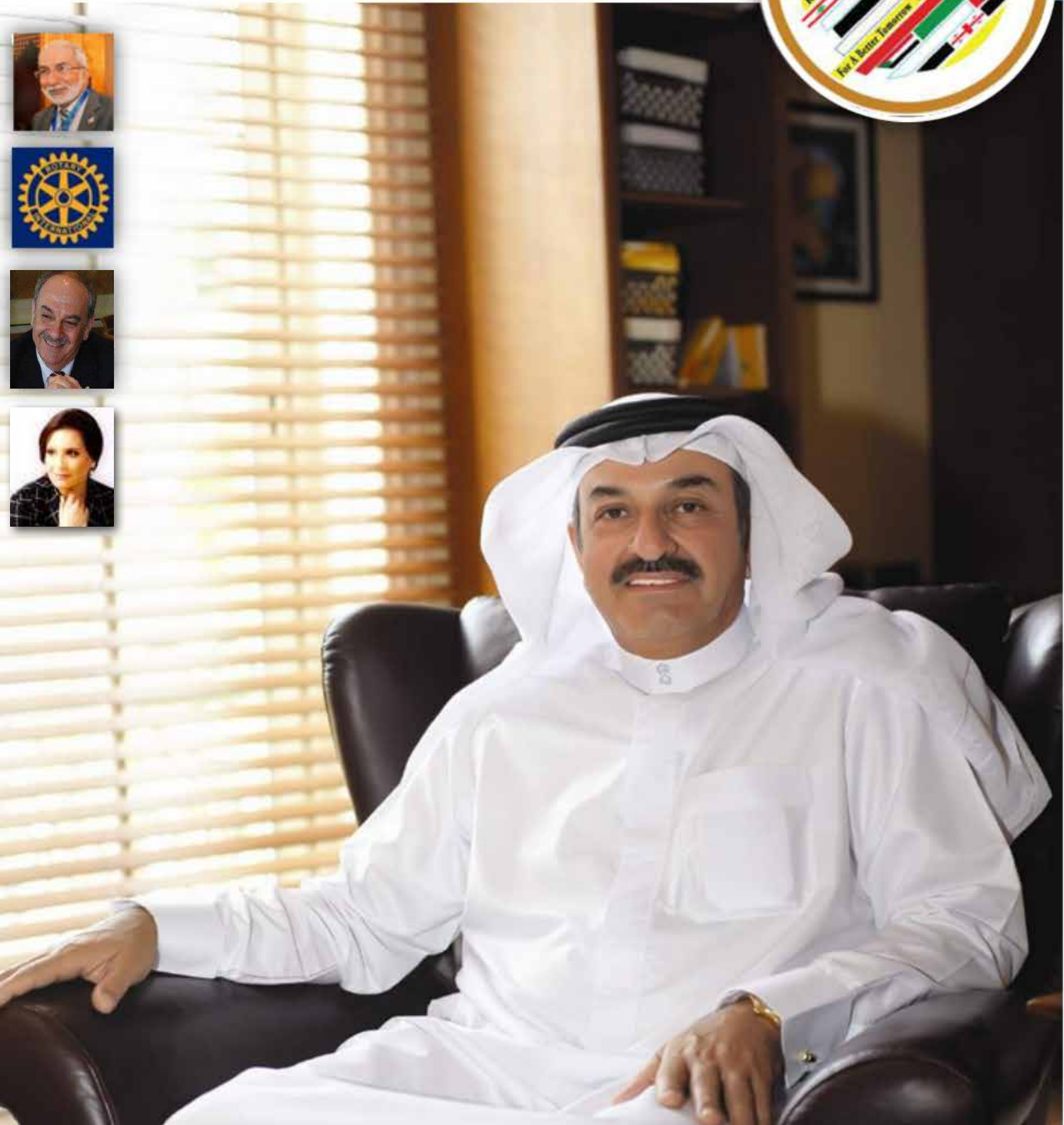
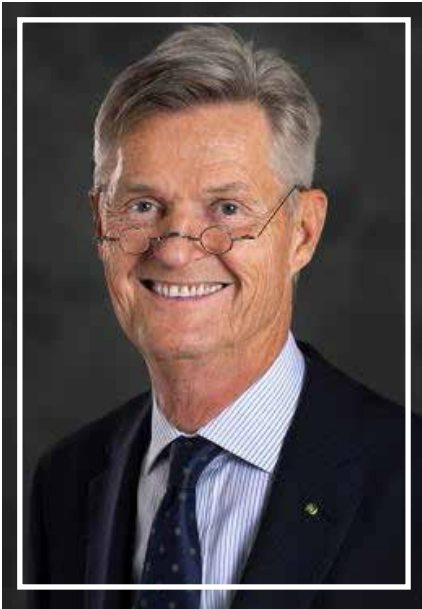

February 2021 - Message

In Rotary, 23 February is our anniversary, and February is also the month when we focus on promoting peace. There is a reason for this: Contributing to peace and international understanding has been a high priority for us since our earliest days.

We are often asked: “How can we get involved in peace now?” There are many paths to peace in Rotary. Our youth programs point us in the direction of Positive Peace, as does the work of intercountry committees and the Rotary Action Group for Peace.

Another path is the Rotarian Peace Projects Incubator (RPPI), an inspirational collaboration among Rotarians, Rotaractors, and Rotary Peace Fellows and alumni. Led by Rotarians in Switzerland and Liechtenstein, RPPI has designed 48 global projects that any club can support, either directly or through Rotary Foundation global grants. Nino Lotishvili and Matthew Johnsen, alumni of the Rotary Peace Center at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok, Thailand, are two of the many volunteers.

During my Rotary peace journey, I have learned how personal resilience helps build inner peace and create sustainable outer peace. This was the inspiration behind the Women Peace Ambassadors for the South Caucasus project, which is based on my field research in Georgia. The RPPI team of Rotarians and peace fellows recognized the incredible potential of women from mixed-ethnicity families who live on borderlands to be role models for peace within and beyond their communities. Through workshops on building inner and outer peace that draw on the power of storytelling, 40 participants will be sharing their stories and reaching around 400 extended family and community members. These inspiring but marginalized women will reclaim their inner strength as peacebuilders at the grassroots level. In this way, we will take steps toward the sustainable, peaceful society we need so much, not only in our region, but throughout the world. — Nino Lotishvili

I was excited to join the peace incubator project and to further strengthen my ties with Rotary’s peace community by working with past and current peace fellows to develop these proposals. My team wrote five proposals — three in Bangladesh, one in Iraq, and one in Poland — that focus on the arts and on education to generate dialogue across religious divisions and avert the radicalization of young people. I was inspired by how, despite the pandemic, we came together via

technology with a vision to develop, test, and strengthen ideas and to produce workable solutions that clubs across the world can support to advance peace. I am excited to work with Rotary's peace community to transform these visions into reality. — Matthew Johnsen

The Rotary Foundation “supports education through scholarships, donations and service projects around the world.”



JANUARY IS VOCATIONAL SERVICE MONTH

Vocational Service is the core of Rotary and serves as the foundation from which we serve our communities around the world. It works on empowering others by using our unique skills and expertise to address community needs, help others acquire or refine their skills, introduce them to new ideas or advance their professional opportunities and interests.

The beginning of the year is an opportunity to plan and start Vocational Service Activities that span over the year.

So the Vocational Service can start by discussing possible Activities, then choosing the appropriate community projects for Vocational Service and



allocating the funds to make them happen.

How to go about this?

1. Take time to learn about fellow member's occupations and professions.
2. Discuss how their expertise and skills can be useful to the community.
3. Find out how this can be used to guide others in their vocational or professional development.
4. Use this expertise in the community to create mentorship, internship, training or inspire young people to achieve their goals.

It has been suggested that the focus of the above should be on the following:

- A. The recognition that all useful occupations are worthwhile, not those just pursued by Rotarians.
- B. The contribution of Vocational talents of Rotarians to solve problems and needs of community.
- C. The promotion of ethical standards in occupations including fair treatment of employers, employees, associates, competitors and the public.

Examples of such activities include career guidance for students, public awareness activities to support vocations that are needed by the

community, a vocational training center for specific skills to help those of low income and the unemployed, vocational training sessions for certain professions like teachers for instance, vocational guidance for small businesses in financial decision- making. It is like a Rotary “skill- sharing” program.



The Heart of Rotary

Vocational Service remains at the heart of Rotary. In 1987-88, RI President Charles C. Keller reinvigorated the Avenue by appointing the first Vocational Service Committee in 50 years. The committee redefined how clubs could more effectively participate in Vocational Service and drafted the new Declaration of Rotarians in Businesses and Professions.

What are the Vocational needs of your community?

Let us start exploring and planning “For a Better Tomorrow”.

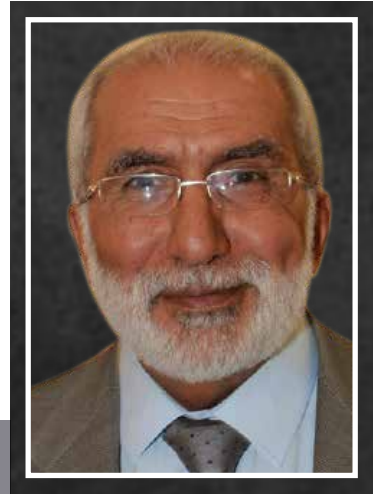

Rotary Public Image - What Is It and What You Can Do About It?

Rotary International turned on a multiyear initiative of unparalleled scale to strengthen the Rotary image. In addition to expanding public understanding of what Rotary does, we want to motivate, engage, and inspire current and prospective members, donors, and the Rotarians who incessantly serve the world in Service Above Self.

The Rotary Public Image is how Rotary is perceived by the world. How people think about. Rotary's "Voice" is the unique tone and style in which we communicate. There is no

organization quite like Rotary. By using a unified "voice" in all our interactions, we ensure our communications capture our distinct character — and how people experience Rotary. By speaking, writing, and designing in one voice, our communications will look, feel, and sound unmistakably like Rotary and that's what a Rotarian should be in the eyes of the world.

Rotary International has chosen a concise title for its main Public Image guidelines, "Voice and Visual Identity Guidelines." All the tools and other documents can be found on the Rotary International Website. Nonetheless, here are the names: the one on the left side is "The Rotary Master Brand" and the one on the right side is "The Rotary Mark Of Excellence." The Master Brand can be displayed by itself however the Mark of Excellence can NOT be displayed by itself, it must be "close by" the Master Brand.

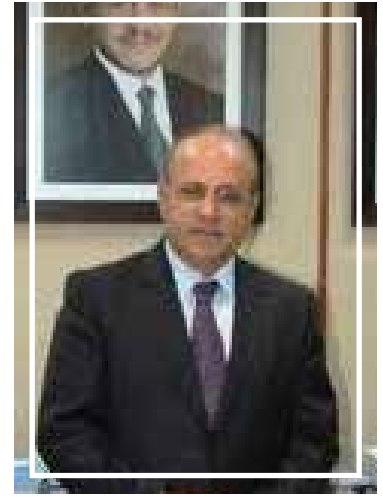

THE GOVERNOR “DISTRICT 2452” DESERVES

Our district 2452 is a unique district in its form and constituency (9 countries in 3 different continents) hence governing such a district should also be unique and necessitates a governor with special capabilities. In this article (and more to come) I shall try and stipulate what are the qualities that a district 2452 governor should possess to run the district successfully.

I am going to assume that the people of the different countries in the district are all humanly similar in their basic needs, however this assumption is not necessarily correct when it comes to their habits and aspirations.

Culturally there are well defined variations and similarities within the countries that most ordinary people can easily identify. A Jordanian, for example, acts and reacts differently from a Cypriot or an Emirati when it comes to social and business interaction with different gender. Moreover, what impresses a human being in Lebanon is in some aspects could be different from what impresses a person in Armenia. A Sudanese could look, act, or aspire differently from a Georgian. These facts necessitate that a District 2452 governor must have the experience that bring all these differences into his pot of knowledge ready to retrieve any moment.

We, as Rotarians, agree that when a DG meets with a Rotary Club, within his country or other countries in the district, he must convey messages that entertain, enlighten and energize his audience if he intends to run a

successful meeting. The sequence of effects I just mentioned is crucial and it should vary depending on the type and quality of audience; dominant age, level of education, level of experience in rotary and in life, and the current political and social atmosphere in the country. For example, circumstances may need to start your meeting with entertaining comments, other circumstances may imply starting your meeting with enlightening comments. Depth of knowledge and experience of your surroundings could save or break a meeting.

Rotary, like any other organization, has members of different backgrounds. Most, I can firmly state here, are of good nature, intentions and morals. However, some, though not many, are not. Hence, the governor can find himself in situations that needs a whole range of life experience (not just Rotary experience) to handle such situations.

DID YOU KNOW?

FIRST NAMES OR NICKNAMES

From the earliest days of Rotary, members have referred to each other on a first-name basis. Since personal acquaintanceship and friendship are cornerstones of Rotary, it was natural that many clubs adopted the practice of setting aside formal titles in conversations among members. Individuals who normally would be addressed as Doctor, Professor, Mister, the Honorable or Sir are regularly called Joe, Bill, Charley or Jerry by other Rotarians. The characteristic Rotary club name badge fosters the first-name custom. In a few areas, such as Europe, club members use a more formal style in addressing fellow members. In other parts of the world, mainly in Asian countries, the practice is to assign each new Rotarian a humorous nickname which relates to some personal characteristic or which is descriptive of the member's business or profession. A member nicknamed "Oxygen" is the manufacturer of chemical gas products. "Trees" is the nickname for the Rotarian in the lumber business, "Building" is the contractor, "Paper" is the stationery or office supply retailer. Other members might carry nicknames like "Muscles," "Foghorn" or "Smiles" as commentaries on their physical features. The nicknames are frequently a source of good-natured fun and fellowship. But whether a Rotarian is addressed by a given first name or a nickname, the spirit of personal friendship is the initial step, which opens doors to all other opportunities for service.

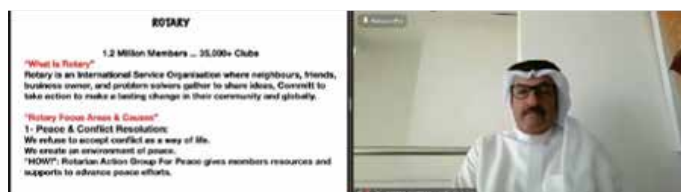
Rotary Member Orientation Training:

End of 2020 was full of challenges for Armenia and Armenians around the globe. 44 days of unprecedented military actions reacted in thousands of fallen and injured combatants.

Though within a context of very sad developments, Armenians all over the world and friends of Armenia consolidated their efforts to help the country in the humanitarian crisis.

Rotarian fellows were and are not an exception. A brilliant manifestation of friendship and fellowship is a though small scale but high impact project in partnership with the Rotary Club of Moscow International, D 2223.

Initiated by the Club President Patrik Mayer, the entire membership supported a much needed medical project. The RC Moscow International supplied Armenia with very important surgical devices necessary for traumatological operations.

The devices have been officially transferred to the RC Yerevan by and at the Embassy of the Russian Federation in Armenia. The entire stock of devices was equally supplied between the three leading hospitals in Yerevan that carry out the most complex surgeries of the injured civilians and combatants.

"We are extremely thankful to our Russian fellow Rotarians for the invaluable assistance, attention and attitude. The devices appear to be life saving for hundreds of injured during the military actions", said Dr. Ruben Galstyan, a Rotarian Traumatologist who, together with other two Rotarian doctors carried out hundreds of successful surgeries in the frontline and in Yerevan.

RC Yerevan thanks its fellow Rotarian doctors and Moscow International fellows for this invaluable experience.

Rotary Club Tbilisi Ambassador

The most vulnerable group in the coronavirus pandemic are the aged people, especially when they are lonely and homeless. In the current situation, helping them is equivalent to saving their health or lives.

"Rotary Club Tbilisi Ambassador" studied the needs of the elderly people living in the shelter "Betheli" in Tbilisi. The shelter currently houses 40 elderly and homeless people from different ethnic or religious minorities. Many of them are precariously ill. Therefore it was especially important to protect them from the coronavirus. Members of the "Rotary Club Tbilisi Ambassador" provided the people in need with a washing machine, also – with many food products and in addition with sanitary-hygienic items which were urgently needed: hand sanitizer and disinfectant fluid; special disposable coats (with back fastening) for caregivers, disposable headgear and gloves.

We, as members of RC Chouf besides some devoted citizens in the area, trying to replace the government by helping our hospitals to survive. This is the picture that I would like you to convey it to our dear Governor. Rotary Lebanon is not involved ! Sorry to say that.

1) We reached to almost finalize a GG. We bought industrial washing Machine and dryer for Ain W Zein hospital for 20000\$+ PPE for 14500\$+ 2 hospital beds on the way yo deliver. The cost is 7500\$ (we weren't able to go on the site due to the corona but they sent us few photos).

2) We bought two ventilators for Ain w Zein hospital for around 22000\$ (Money given by donors). We also bought from donors 5 Oxygene machines that we distributed in 5 villages + PPE's.

3) We are now in the process of getting 3 extra ventilators with PPE's and medicines for Chouf Clinics.

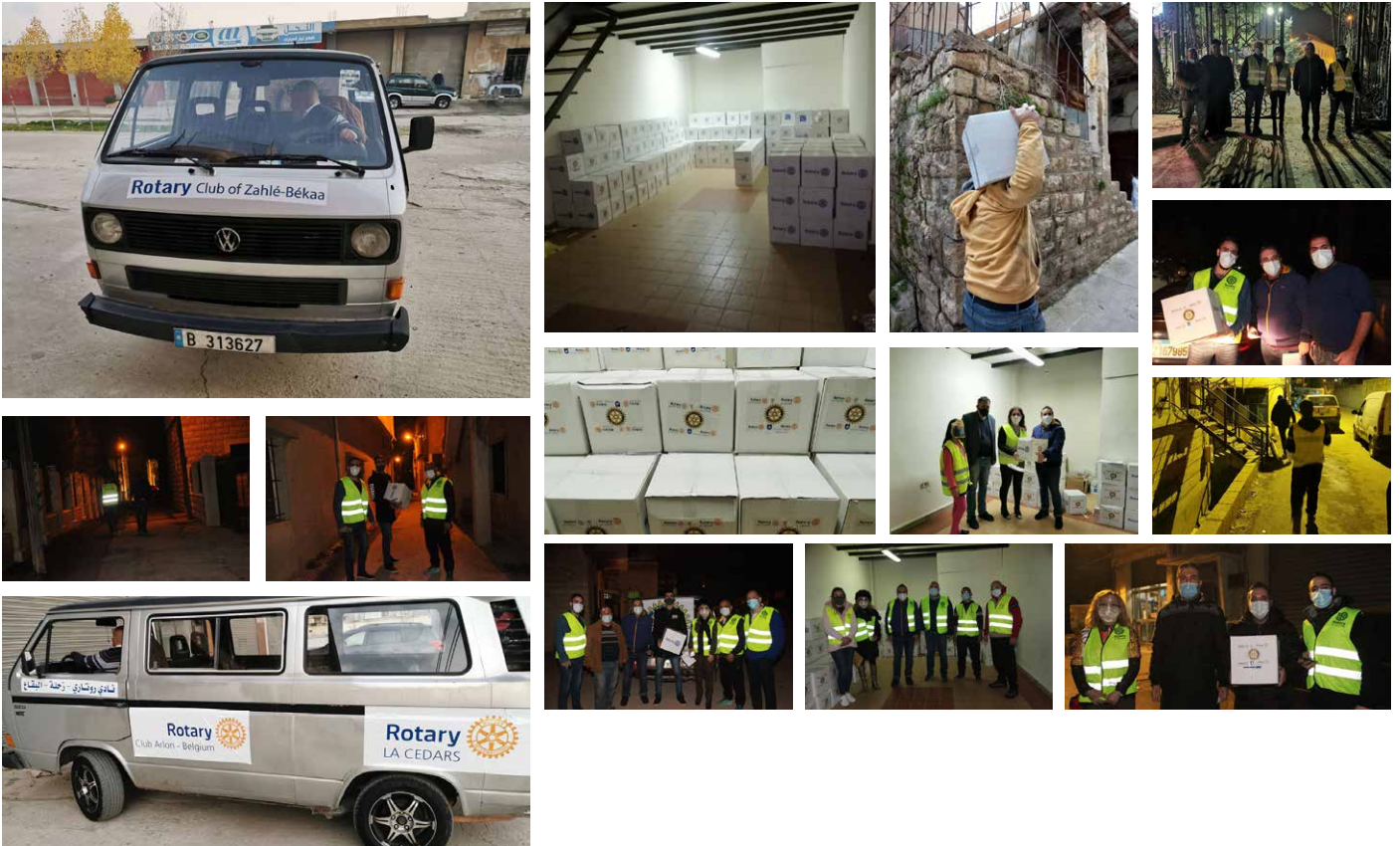
