Dear Rotarians, Rotaractors, and friends,

- Work on the Rotary's Public Image by working closely with the Media and Government organizations to clarify our goals and help in our fund gathering activities.



The roots of Rotary's polio eradication efforts

On 29 September 1979, volunteers administered drops of oral polio vaccine to children at a health center in Guadalupe Viejo, Makati, Philippines. The event in metropolitan Manila was arranged and attended by Rotarians and delegates from the Philippine Ministry of Health.

When James L. Bomar Jr., then RI president, put the first drops of vaccine into a child's mouth, he ceremonially launched the Philippine poliomyelitis immunization effort. Rotary's first Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) Grant project was underway.

Bomar and Enrique M. Garcia, the country's minister of health, had earlier signed an agreement committing Rotary International and the government of the Philippines to a joint multiyear effort to immunize about 6 million children against polio, at a cost of about \$760,000.

In a 1993 interview, Bomar reminisced about the trip. He recalled how the brother of one of the children he had immunized tugged on his pant leg to get his attention and said, "Thank you, thank you, Rotary."

The project's success led Rotary to make polio eradication a top priority. Rotary launched PolioPlus in 1985 and was a founding member of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative in 1988. Through decades of commitment and work by Rotary and our partners, more than 2.5 billion children have received the oral polio vaccine.


Rotary's two official mottoes

Arthur Frederick Sheldon, the Rotarian whose convention speech inspired Rotary's secondary motto, One Profits Most Who Serves Best

Service Above Self and One Profits Most Who Serves Best, Rotary's official mottoes, can be traced back to the early days of the organization.

In 1911, the second Rotary convention, in Portland, Oregon, USA, approved He Profits Most Who Serves Best as the Rotary motto. The wording was adapted from a speech that Rotarian Arthur Frederick Sheldon delivered to the first convention, held in Chicago the previous year. Sheldon declared that "only the science of right conduct toward others pays. Business is the science of human services. He profits most who serves his fellows best."

The Portland gathering also inspired the motto Service Above Self. During an outing on the Columbia River, Ben Collins, president of the Rotary Club of Minneapolis, Minnesota, USA, talked with Seattle Rotarian J.E. Pinkham about the proper way to organize a Rotary club, offering the principle his club had adopted: Service, Not Self. Pinkham invited Rotary founderPaul Harris, who also was on the trip, to join their conversation.

Harris asked Collins to address the convention, and the phrase Service, Not Self was met with great enthusiasm. At the 1950 Rotary International Convention in Detroit, Michigan, USA, two slogans were formally approved as the official mottoes of Rotary: He Profits Most Who Serves Best and Service Above Self. The 1989 Council on Legislation established Service Above Self as the principal motto of Rotary because it best conveys the philosophy of unselfish volunteer service. He Profits Most Who Serves Best was modified to They Profit Most Who Serve Best in 2004 and to its current wording, One Profits Most Who Serves Best, in 2010.

The start of Rotary in South America

Rotary extended its reach to South America when the Rotary Club of Montevideo, Uruguay, was chartered on 1 February 1919. Rotarians had been interested in expanding to South America as early as 1916, and had focused on Argentina, Brazil, and Chile. But the first club was instead chartered in Uruguay, thanks to the efforts of Herbert P. Coates. Coates, a native of England, had lived in South America for many years.

He became acquainted with Rotary while on a business trip to Cincinnati, Ohio, USA, in 1916. He found that many businessmen in the city were busy with the Rotary Convention taking place there. Intrigued, he arranged to visit Rotary headquarters and asked about starting a club in Uruguay.

Coates returned to Montevideo with approval to start a club, and his work led to an organizational meeting in July 1918. That December, he and 21 other charter members submitted the club's formal application to Rotary. Coates later helped start a club in Buenos Aires, Argentina, and served as a special commissioner for expanding Rotary in South America.

Rotary founder Paul Harris described Coates as instrumental in spreading Rotary to and throughout the continent. Rotarians there agreed and referred to Coates, whom they called Don Heriberto, as the "Father of Rotary in South America."

District Budget

Each Club President has received on Tuesday 9 June 2020 from DGE Mazen Alumran an mail about the so called District Budget, which requires approval before the start of Mazen's term. By the time of reading, I expect that the approval from the District has been given.

In this newsletter I will talk about this budget.

Simply spoken there is money going in (income) and going out (expenditure).

The income is 2 fold: USD 28 levy per member and USD 15,000 which is an amount from the incumbent DG which allows the DGE to get started with some financial support (the so called Rolling Seed Fund). The same amount is also an expense as the DG will transfer this to the new DGE.

Regarding the levy: Each member pays an annual membership. For example in our Rotary Club of Manama is BHD 80 (around USD 212). An amount of USD 28 goes to the District and USD 40 goes to Rotary International. The remaining is used to run the club.

The USD 28 multiplie by around 2050 Rotarians in District 2452 gives us USD 57,400 as Income. We need to pay everything from this USD 57,400.

So what are our expenses: we have to run a secretariat (USD 10k), the District Team Training Seminar (already conducted in Feb 2020 in Bahrain; USD 20k), awards (5k), more training (we increased this number compared to previous years as we found this is one the of the key areas where a District plays it's role; 14k), the District website (2k), public image (3k) and some bank costs and contingencies (3,4k). Total: USD 57,400. If there is any money left (less expenses than income), the DG will donate this to a project in the district.

Did You Know about? The District Governor

The Rotary district governor performs a very significant function in the world of Rotary.

He or she is the single officer of Rotary International in their geographic area, called a Rotary district, which usually includes about 45 Rotary clubs. The 528 district governors, who have been extensively trained at the worldwide International Assembly, provide the "quality control" for over 30,000 Rotary clubs of the world. They are responsible for maintaining high performance within the clubs of their district. The district governor, who must make an official visit to each club in his district, is never regarded as an "inspector general." Rather, he visits as a helpful and friendly adviser to the club officers, as a useful counselor to further the Object of Rotary among the clubs of his district, and as a catalyst to help strengthen the programs of Rotary.

The district governor is a very experienced Rotarian who generously devotes a year of their life to the volunteer task of leadership. The

governor has a wealth of knowledge about current Rotary pro- grams, purposes, policies and goals. He or she is a person of recognized high standing in their profession, community and Rotary club. They must supervise the organization of new clubs and strengthen existing ones.

They perform a host of specific duties to assure that the quality of Rotary does not falter in their district. They are responsible to promote and implement all programs and activities of the Rotary International president and the R.I. Board of Directors. The governor plans and directs a district conference and other special events. Each district governor performs a very important role in the worldwide operations of Rotary.
